URBAN RESPONSES TO STREET TRADING: INDIA

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Total number of Street Vendors in India: 10 Million

- a No laws regulating this trade
- ર Viewed as illegal activity
- a Vendors pay 10% to 20% as rents to authorities

SUPREME COURT RULING Sudhan Singh vs. NDMC, 1989

"If properly regulated according to the exigency of the circumstances, the small traders on the sidewalks can considerably add to the comfort and convenience of the general public, by making available ordinary articles of everday use for a comparatively lesser price"

Ruling furthers states:

"The right to carry on trade or business mentioned in Article 19(1)g of the Constitution, on street pavements, if properly regulated cannot be denied on the ground that streets are meant exclusively for passing and repassing and no other use"

BELLAGIO DECLARATION ON STREET VENDING 1998

- શ Self Employed Women's Association (SEWA) initiated formation of national organisation.
- ગ્ National Alliance of Street Vendors of India (NASVI) formed in September 1998.
- a April 1999, NASVI conducted a survey on Street Vending in 7 cities.

TOWARDS A NATIONAL POLICY

- A May 2001: National Workshop at New Delhi on Street Vendors organised jointly by SEWA and Ministry of Urban Development, Government of India.
- Minister declares formation of National Task
 Force on Street Vendors headed by Minister of
 State for drafting a National Policy.

NATIONAL POLICY

- Designation of areas through a participatory process. Stress on self-regulation.
- શ Ward Committees in each Municipal Ward to decide on modalities
- ગૂ Street Vendors to have 40% representation. One-third women vendors.

Legalising Street Vending

- ญ State Govts. Asked to modify Police Act
- ର୍ Include Vendors' Representatives in urban planning
- ગ્ર Licenses to street vendors scrapped
- _Ω Street Vendors to be given Identity Cards instead.
- શ Emphasis on unions.

Follow-up Action

- ญ Majority of States accept policy
- ગ્ Awaits Cabinet approval
