



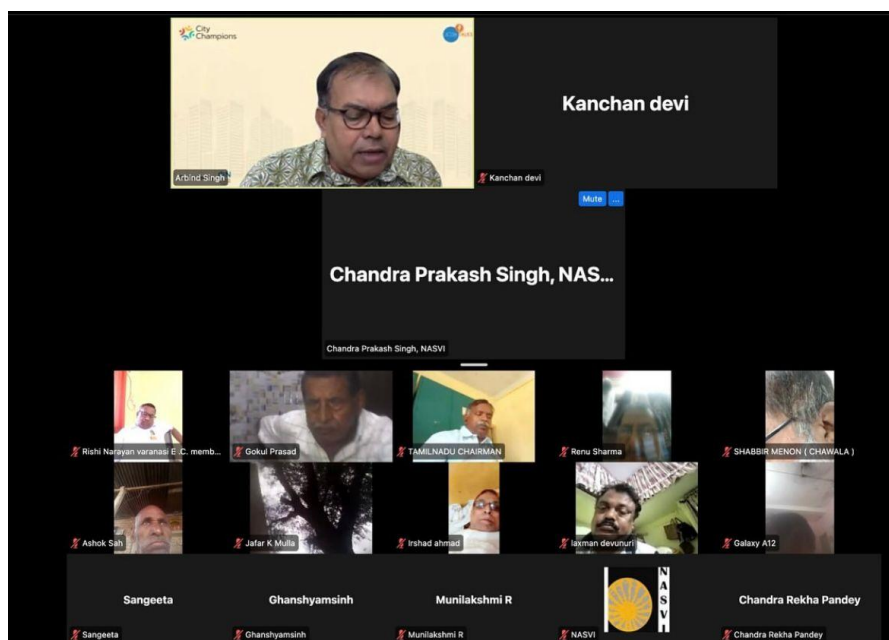
# Executive Committee Zoom Meeting

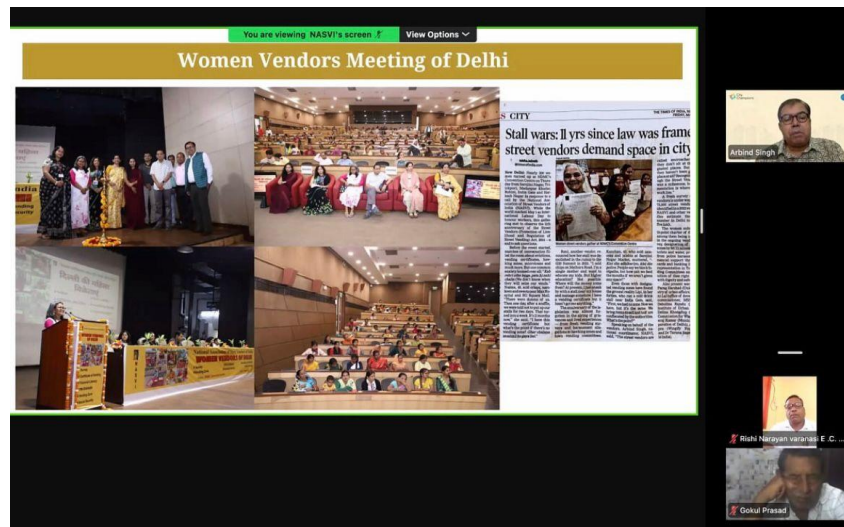

National Coordinator, Arbind Singh, presented the presentation on activities from March to May 2025, where activities & achievements from across the country were presented. He also emphasised that NASVI is in continuous talks with different stakeholders like the Ministry of Urban & Housing Affairs, to issue guidelines for the implementation of the Street Vendors Act, Vending Zones, and other factors.



Later, state reports were given by Executive members:

<b>Uttar Pradesh</b>	<p>Most of the corporations in Uttar Pradesh did not have an elected Town Vending Committee</p> <p>Continuous and arbitrary evictions by officials with no prior notice. For evictions, there are no written orders. Town Vending Committee Members are not heard in any way. TVC Meetings have not been conducted for years. Vending Zones &amp; night bazaars in Prayagraj have no vendors in them.</p>
<b>Rajasthan</b>	<p>Rajasthan Municipal Corporation is not implementing the Street Vendor Act. Every day, goods of street vendors are confiscated during drives. Licenses are not being issued, and the problems faced by street vendors are not being resolved. Despite the High Court's stay order, both Greater Jaipur and Heritage Jaipur Municipal Corporations continue to act arbitrarily. Street vendors are being exploited. No COVs distributed till date by Municipal Bodies. The Town Vending Committee does not hold meetings every three months, which is why the issues of street vendors are not being addressed.</p> <p>Constructed Vending Zones have no street vendors and are occupied by Non-street vendors.</p>
<b>Himachal Pradesh</b>	<p>Implementation of the Act &amp; scheme is necessary. The National Highway Authority of India is evicting a large number of vendors.</p> <p>Regular TVC Meetings</p> <p>Construction of Vending Zones.</p>
<b>Karnataka</b>	<p>Survey of Bengaluru is still incomplete.</p> <p>The survey is not been conducted</p> <p>Vending zones needs to be developed.</p>
<b>West Bengal</b>	<p>The state government is reluctant to push the implementation of the Street Vendors Act 2014 and PM SVANidhi. Prominent markets like the New Market area are under the mafia or non-street vendor Raj. The Town Vending Committee is formed</p>



	on paper, but there is no clarification whether the members are representatives of the Street Vendors. Irregular TVC Meetings.
<b>Tamil Nadu</b>	Reconstitution of Town Vending Committee and in the meantime, previous TVC should function. Survey of Street Vendors periodically Construction and allotment of Vending Zones. In Chennai, earlier 15 committees were formed for 15 zones which have 90 members in total, but now that committee is shrunk to 6 members, which is hindering the marking and decision of vending zones.
<b>Uttarakhand</b>	High rates for vending zones, almost 1.5 lakhs were demanded from street vendors in Rudrapur for vending zones. Evictions of street vendors. Urgency to create and designation of more vending zones in the state.

On 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> July NASVI will be organising India Street Vendor Forum 2025, for which participation of vendor leaders were discussed in detail.

NASVI will be submitting a letter to MoHUA regarding state issues, each EC member was requested to submit state wise issues.

Later resolution was passed where National Coordinator was assigned as the signatory person for any legal intervention.

"Resolved that Mr. Arbind Singh, S/o Baidyanath Singh, National Coordinator of New Association of Street Vendors of India (NASVI), is hereby authorized to initiate and/or defend all legal proceedings / depose any affidavit before any / All Courts of Law / Tribunals / Commissions / Forums, for and on behalf of the Society- NASVI, with a view to protect and promote the interests and rights of its members and street vendors and any such action taken by him previously in the month of April-May 2025 is also hereby ratified."

The meeting ended with fruitful conversations and participation at the forum.
